Scientific Name: *Antigonia capros* (Masuda, H., et al. 1984). A member of the Boarfish family; this genus is characterized by their vertically compressed bodies.

Common Names: Deepbody Boarfish

Maximum size: 25.0 cm standard length

Size recorded: 16.6cm fork length

Physiology: Orange reddish in color, with orange yellowish margins on caudal, ventral and dorsal fins. This specie has an upward oblique protruding mouth. Boarfish also have well developed dorsal and ventral spines.

Gender: Female, mature.

Habitat: Deep-sea associated; marine; depth range 50-750 meters. Boarfish inhabits deep benthic habitats. As juveniles they are found in midwater depths.

Distribution: Subtropical and tropical oceans, Western Pacific, Marianas, Hawaiian Islands, Honshu southward, South Africa and Atlantic Ocean.

Diet: Possibly feeds on small mollusks and crustaceans.

Climate: Tropical
